THE CRISIS IN OUR UMMAH

Are We Being Punished?

The wisdom we fail to comprehend.

The Messenger of Allah SallAllahu 'alayhi wasallam said: 'This Ummah of mine is one to which mercy is shown. It will have no punishment in the next world, but its punishment in this world will be trials, earthquakes and being killed.' [Abu Dawud]

He also said: 'The greatest reward comes with the greatest trial. When Allah loves a people He tests them. Whoever is content will win His pleasure but whoever is discontent will earn His anger.' [Ibn Majah]

Sometimes we may question the wisdom behind the suffering and trials in Syria, Myanmar and elsewhere. It is true that we can bring this upon ourselves due to our sins. However it is also true, as the authentic ahadith mention, that those who are most firm on their deen are the ones most tested by Allah.

The question then arises: is the suffering we see in the Ummah a punishment or a test? This can be ascertained by our response. If we become closer to Allah through these trials, then it is a test, and if we move further away, then it is a punishment.

Allah says: 'Corruption has flourished on land and sea as a result of people's actions and He will make them taste the consequences of some of their own actions so that they may turn back.'
[Q 30:41]

In the short-term, the suffering is painful and difficult, but when viewed through the lens of the hereafter, our perspective changes.

The Messenger of Allah told us: 'On the Day of Judgement, when the people who were tested (in this world) will be given their rewards, the people who were spared will wish that their skins had been cut off with scissors while they were in the world.' [Tirmidhi]

TO CREATE HOPE FOR **TODAY & TOMORROW**

After their father's death, the exact numbers of orphan students who are no longer in school is difficult to measure where the learning losses that come with children not being in school have the potential to last a lifetime.

This is not the case with children who have reached Ummah Children Academy, Nowshera Wana, Ummah College of Technology, Nowshera and Ummah Centre for the Disabled,

Ummah Children Academy

For ensuring that learning systems are built back better and stress free which can be reflected from the lived experiences of nealected children (orphans), Ummah Welfare Trust (Pak) established a free-of-cost residential educational facility in 2007 located at G.T Road Soria Khel, Nowshera

Orphan children from all over Pakistan are enrolled at the academy after clearing the entry test where they are allowed to access free-of-cost quality-education (Modern | Islamic), boarding, food, medical-care and recreational services.

For hundreds of previously neglected orphans, educational and emotional care at the academy turned into a way out from the marginalization as they are now entering their practical life nearing to complete their higher studies in various subjects including Medical, Engineering, LAW, Information Technologies, Business Administration and many others.

An Academy in Wana

To learn and succeed in their life is not an easy task for the children living in remote and isolated parts of the developing countries like Pakistan but this is no more a concern for the enrolled orphan students at Ummah Children Academy, Wana, South Waziristan.

Born in one of the most conflict-affected region of Pakistan, orphan students remain more at risk of dropping out of school, with many never to return as there is no one to pay for their schooling but this is not the case for 570 orphans who are enrolled Ummah Children Academy, Wana, who are provided with free of-cost education opportunities at their

Care For The Special Children's

After Ummah Children Academy at Nowshera and Wana, an inclusive education initiative for transforming the life of children with special needs was established in form of Ummah Centre for the Disabled at Rawalpindi.

Children with special needs are among the most marginalized and vulnerable in many countries, and they are the most likely to be excluded from education as they often face a multitude of barriers in attending, participating in, and ultimately benefitting

64 most-deserving children with special needs are allowed at the Ummah Centre for the Disabled to have access to educational (Modern | Islamic) as well as rehabilitation services for the full fledged reintegration into the society.



The hallmark of technical education and vocational training is its focus on practical skills and work-readiness as practical skills are mostly acquired through learning-by-doing, which occurs in workshops and laboratories or through hands-on experience at the workplace.

After successful implementation of traditional education, the charity went a step further by entering into technical education and vocational training sector by establishing Ummah College of Technology in 2015 for the orphan students at

The college is currently offering various technologies courses (Diploma of Associate Engineering) including civil, electrical, mechanical and petroleum along with short courses surveying draftsman and CAD, electrician and carpentry etc. as well as one-year diploma in Information Technology.

A WEALTH OF HEALTH

Dialysis Center

Expanding access to quality and affordable health-care services is a central element to eliminating extreme poverty and promoting shared prosperity.

Chronic kidney disease (CKD), which causes people to lose their kidney function over time.

Once kidney failure occurs, affected individuals require a kidney transplant or weekly dialysis treatment as they will live only a few months at most without treatment.

Despite the importance of dialysis, thousands of newly diagnosed with CKD each year die within months due to lack of treatment as services are fragmented and largely concentrated in big cities where high prices and the need for frequent treatments make dialysis a financial burden for many patients and unaffordable for others.

For allowing the poor and needy kidney patients to access quality but free-of-cost dialysis services, UWT (Pak) established a dialysis centre in June, 2009 and still remain the only lifeline for hundreds of kidney patients of district Swabi and surrounding areas.

Equipped with state-of-the-art dialysis machines and staffed with skilled employees, dialysis sessions were performed for the visiting kidney patients.

Gift of Sight

Globally, cataract surgery is the most frequently performed type of surgery, consistently producing excellent outcomes for patients where success rates are over 95 per cent and total recovery time can be less than one week.

But in Pakistan, people with cataracts had few options for surgery as government hospitals offering free cataract surgeries are unable to accommodate the volume of patients, and waiting times could be as high as a year where private providers offers better quality and more timely services, but at prices that is too high for much of the population.

To fill the gap, UWT (Pak) Cataract Surgeries project is a new way of seeing the world for the poor eye patients after undergoing for a Cataract surgery and ultimately avoiding needless blindness.

The significant presence of large number of religious schools (Madaris) makes the education sector in Pakistan unique.

The religious education sector comprises both registered religious school (Madaris) as well as independent unregistered religious school (Madaris) providing Islamic education to both male and female students.

The presence of large number of religious schools (Madaris) makes education easy for the students from poor families particularly in rural parts of the country as parents with inadequate resources always target these institutions to enrolled their children.

Most of these religious schools (Madaris) don't charge any type of fees and also provide free food, lodging facilities to the enrolled students alongside provision of clothes and textbooks as well.

The vital role of religious schools (Madaris) in spreading the message of Islam among the Muslims across Pakistan is undeniable as the spiritual suffering from millions of students been permanently eliminated by these religious school (Madaris) over the years.

Hifdh Sponsorship

Memorization of the Holy Quran is an extremely noble task for the followers of Islam with innumerable rewards in this world and hereafter for all those who contribute to this noble cause.

To take forward the legacy of Hifdh, UWT (Pak) is implementing a unique DAWAH intervention in form of Hifdh Sponsorship allowing teachers and students in some of the isolated parts of Pakistan to memorize the Holy Quran.

The project also allows sponsored teachers and students to have access to some sort of financial assistance as they are reimbursed quarterly.

Teacher Sponsorship

Teachers remain central to the learning process anywhere in the world in any form of education (Modern | Religious) as without a teacher a student and an entire class cannot go forward in their lessons.

As like modern education, teachers in religious education are also considered the main input for helping students to learn as the positive impact of a high-performing teacher can be enough for long-lasting, positive effects on the future education and learning outcomes of a students.

To allow the committed Islamic Teachers to continue their teaching services and support their families as well, UWT (Pak) Teacher Sponsorship project is producing the desired results as the reimbursed teachers are allowing the students to the learn the Holy Quran by Nazira and other basics of Islam in Pakistan.











Holy Qur'an & Text Books

For much-needed spiritual nourishment, Muslims recite verses from the Holy Quran and also memorize it for everlasting rewards.

Under DAWAH project, UWT (Pak) distributed 13,000 copies of the Holy Quran were effectively distributed in religious schools (Madaris) in Pakistan, Alhamdulillah.

Parents with limited financial resources in Pakistan are unable to pay for the education-related expenses as parents have pushed back their children from education for years.

UWT (Pak) had provided in-kind support to religious schools (Madaris) and helped to ease the burden on families and give equal access to education for all the benefitted students.

With this unexpected but welcomed gesture, 13,000 students were enabled to learn their lessons with a solid foundation and address their long standing spiritual suffering.

With this intervention, the quality of education improved where efficiency and access was also ensured for 191 students (100 male | 91 female) in Pakistan.

Orphaned children are vulnerable to being neglected or becoming homeless, being victims of child trafficking, abuse and child labour.

As like other children, orphaned children also have the right to be educated, both formally and informally, they have the right to live free from fear and discrimination, safe from violence, and protected from abuse and exploitation.

Unfortunately, orphaned children in developing countries like Pakistan are the least likely to fully experience childhood, a time that should be dedicated to emotional, social and physical development, as well as play.

Pakistan is ranked 149th on the Global Childhood Index by Save the Children out of 176 countries list in stage-3 (many children missing out on childhood).

To allow the children to enjoy some form of childhood, UWT (Pak) Orphan Sponsorship project is a way-out for 1,586 orphans in Pakistan as they are quarterly reimbursed to pay for their schooling to secure a bright future.

Marriage is the sole basis for women's access to social and economic rights and these are lost upon widowhood making these widows invisible and excluded along with their children as they are often hidden from view in their own communities.


The impact of husband's death falls more heavily on the widow, who may be excluded socially and lose their home and property where in the face of widowhood, women often struggle with serious economic hardships.

The disadvantages that widows suffer also affect their families as the children of widowed mothers have worse health outcomes and are less likely to be enrolled in school as their families are trapped in poverty after losing their breadwinner.

To allow the marginalized widows trapped in deep poverty, UWT (Pak) Widow Sponsorship project is allowing 360 widows in Pakistan to pay for the basic needs of their families with protected dignity and as per their priorities.

A SMALL STEP A BIGGER IMPACT

Struggling to Balance

By placing focus on Islamic education and vocational training, Ummah Welfare Trust (Pak) supported and equipped female from disadvantaged communities with improved skillsets, which is a step closer to alleviate poverty, achieve financial independence and allows families to have a sustainable earning on their back on long-term basis.

To allow female from marginalized families to earn a dignified and sustainable income by using learned skills after completing their training and address their spiritual needs, UWT (Pak) established 02 Vocational & Islamic Education Centre, one in Rawalpindi, Punjab and another in Wana, South Waziristan.

Enrolled in 06-month Vocational Training and Islamic Education courses, 02 batch each from both centers graduated where 200 students at Rawalpindi and 60 students at Wana were allowed to complete their courses.

Providing Livelihoods

Inside Pakistan, for millions of low-income families the stigma of poverty remain a lifelong situation as they had to struggle for their survival on little or no income as they have limited income generating opportunities.

Ummah Welfare Trust (Pak) continues to expand and diversify its sustainable livelihood projects because these interventions help lift people out of poverty and ensure their self-reliance and protect their dignity as well.

Alhamdulillah, this year Ummah Welfare Trust (Pak) had allowed 254 families to end their poverty on permanent basis at they were provided with income generation opportunities.

UWT (Pak) had provided 06 Loaders, 46 Rickshaws, 202 Sewing Machine to unemployed persons for allowing them to have an end to their struggle and to start their livelihoods and support their economically challenged families.

Food security exists when all people, at all times, have physical and economic access to sufficient, safe and nutritious food to meet their dietary needs and food preferences for an active and healthy life.

Improving access to safe and nutritious food-and maintaining food security in times of crisis-is fundamental to ensuring the prospects of future generations but the cost of healthy diets is not affordable for billions of people in the world.

New shocks related to climate change, conflicts have hurt food production, disrupted supply chains and stressed people's ability to access nutritious and affordable food, raised fresh concerns for food security in disaster-prone Pakistan.

Alhamdulillah, Ummah Welfare Trust (Pak) ensured food security for 40, 753 food insecure families by distributing Food Aid with the key aim of providing much-needed nutritional assistance.

The lost smile was brought back on the grim faces of 20,400 Pakistani children from marginalized communities on the both the Islamic festivities of Eid-ul-Fitr and Eid-ul-Adha.

Children from disaster-prone Pakistan always remained among the most-affected but most neglected as their priorities are not properly addressed by their families with limited resources.

Each year, on the blessed occasions of Eid-ul-Fitr and Eid-ul-Adha, children from affluent families wear new clothes, shoes, exchange gifts and toys but for children from the poor families this is not the case as they have to wear old clothes and shoes, have nothing to exchange making the special day of Eid, yet another ordinary day in their life.

This year on the Occasion of Eid-ul-Fitr and Eid-ul-Adha, children from several communities inside Pakistan were allowed to wear new clothes and shoes and play with their toys after they received Eid Gifts at UWT (Pak) Eid Gifts distributions.

communities of Pakistan.

This year alone, the charity has built 52 large and small Masjid in Pakistan allowing thousands of poor students and daily worshipers to address their spiritual suffering, Alhamdulillah.





Bringing Warmth, Saving Lives

Millions of people all over the world are not prepared for the icy chill of winter as for impoverished families it is a struggle to put food on the table or to protect themselves from the harsh cold otherwise they will sleep rough.

The freezing winds and temperatures push up survival costs, leaving many of our brothers and sisters facing a life or death situation as the cold season brings another blow to poor families trying to survive with less protection and resources.

Ummah Welfare Trust (Pak) always strives to allow families to protect themselves from the cold during winter months by delivering Winter Aid inside Pakistan.

Alhamdulillah, this year similar supplies were delivered to 3,848 less protected families in Pakistan including quilts and clothing.

Your donations have delivered new homes to hundreds of displaced and impoverished families.

Today, estimated 1.2 billion people live in substandard housing and by 2030 almost 3 billion people will be unable to access an adequate, safe and affordable housing facility with basic services.

Over the past few decades, disasters caused by natural hazards have claimed thousands of lives and resulted in untold damage across Pakistan as the disasters have negatively impacted substandard houses and the families living inside them.

These disasters are becoming more frequent, damaging, and deadly – particularly for the poor households as walls are crumbling, roofs blowing off, and structures collapsing resulting large scale marginalization and housing poverty.

Alhamdulillah, Ummah Welfare Trust (Pak) has built 50 houses in 2018 to provide long-term solutions to families battling homelessness or housing poverty and protect their dignity and wellbeing in Nowshera, Swabi, Charsadda, Kohat, Mansehra and Haripur district in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Layyah, Muzaffargarh and Multan district in Punjab province of Pakistan.

Estimated 1 billion people globally are experiencing some form of disability where most live in developing countries and are among the most excluded groups in the society as they often find it tough to access services, education, or employment opportunities resulting their less participation in the economy, which in turn drives them to poverty and marginalization.

The situation is more miserable in Pakistan as the persons with disabilities are experiencing adverse socioeconomic outcomes than persons without disabilities, such as less education, poorer health outcomes, lower levels of employment, and higher poverty rates which disproportionately affects these vulnerable populations.

Since commencing its relief activities inside Pakistan, Ummah Welfare Trust (Pak) had always reaffirmed its commitment to helping reduce barriers to inclusion and promote equality of opportunity, including for persons with disabilities.

To allow the persons with disabilities (physically disabled), Ummah Welfare Trust (Pak) implemented a comprehensive mobility support intervention by distributing 378 wheelchairs across 08 districts of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and 04 districts of Punjab province of Pakistan where the project effectively restored the lost mobility for the beneficiaries.



Marriage Grants

For many parents, an old custom raises the cost of daughters: at many marriages, the brides' parents pay a dowry to the groom's family where in many cases the dowries are more than the bride's family's total assets.

To support parents suffering from economic hardships to wed-off their loving daughters, Ummah Welfare Trust (Pak) had helped hundreds of our sisters to start their new life happily forever.

This year, 100 Marriage Grants were handed over to parents from marginalized families in several districts of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa and Punjab province of Pakistan which allowed our 100 sisters to start their after marriage life with happiness and dignity.

Hardship Cases

Across Pakistan, hundreds of thousands families live in economic and social hardship, meaning they are unable to meet their basic food and non-food needs as they are uniquely vulnerable to sudden economic shocks.

To offer a hand of support, Ummah Welfare Trust (Pak) delivered a vital cash-based assistance in form of Financial Assistance allowing 79 chronically ill people to pay for their much-needed treatment for immediate health recovery.

New Muslim Sponsorship

Social exclusion is widespread for the Hindus inside interior Sindh, Pakistan who are living from generations in bondage as they inherit debts from their ancestor generation after generation from centuries.

Newly converted 220 children in interior Sindh, Pakistan been reimbursed (£45 each) on quarterly basis to continue their education (modern | Islamic) under the New Muslim Sponsorship project.

The faith-based project had delivered vital cash/faith-based assistance to the sponsored New Muslim children and their disadvantaged families.

In the today technologically advanced world, millions of people still live without electricity and hundreds of millions more live with insufficient or unreliable access to it particularly in developing countries like Pakistan.

Enhancing access to clean energy is a key priority of Ummah Welfare Trust (Pak) and for achieving this goal, Solar Panels are the most cost effective but greater energy generation resources.

23 Solar Panels were installed in Masajid in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa for allowing the worshiper to have access to environment friendly, cost effective and sustainable energy resources.




